

SURVEY OF MEMBERS AND FRIENDS

Executive Summary

Background to the survey

In the current situation, putting on concerts in the short term is almost impossible, but it has given the Committee an opportunity to draw breath and reflect. Over the summer, we solicited the views of BMC current members and friends (former members or occasional visitors) on a range of matters via an online survey. The findings provide a basis for thinking about the opportunities and challenges that lie ahead.

We received 27 completed responses: pretty high by online survey standards, and we thank all those that took time to share their thoughts. It goes without saying that we can only reflect the views of those who actually completed a questionnaire, so there are question marks over how truly representative any such exercise can be. Read the findings with that in mind.

Classical music online

Naturally, in the present uncertain climate, the Committee is interested in the potential for online experiences to enhance or even replace concert-going.

- Most (85%) of our respondents say they watch classical music events online, and for 44% this is a reasonably regular part of their lives: these do so at least once a month (Q3, p.2)
- Of those that consume classical music online, a substantial minority (41%) have paid money to do so (Q4, p.2, if we exclude those who have never watched classical music online)
- At this point in time, general willingness to pay for online classical music content is difficult to quantify. Most people haven't yet done so (Q4, p.2) and their propensity to do so in the future seems very divided. The answers to Q5, p.2 suggest two sub-populations (as indicated by overlapping bell-shaped curves) with roughly one-third clearly resistant, and the other two-thirds rather enthusiastic.
- The comments (Q6, pp3-4) suggest there is a strong mandate for looking more closely at online delivery: 16 of 23 comments positively support this idea. There are caveats, of course. Paraphrasing: it's better than nothing in the current situation, but do we have the technical capability to match professional offerings from, say, the Wigmore Hall?

Return to concert-going

At some point, concert-going will resume. In this part of the survey, we assume in the short term that any return will be under the "new normal": physically distanced, without intervals or refreshments, and with very limited social interaction.

- Confidence is fragile (Q7, p.5): two-thirds (67%) of respondents would be "very willing" or "willing" to return under these conditions: the remainder are either "undecided" (19%) or "unwilling" (15%) to do so. On the basis of these numbers, the Club would face considerable financial risk putting on concerts in the short term.
- The comments (Q8, p.6) suggest a general willingness to put up with a lot of restrictions (physical distancing, masks, hand sanitisers, temperature testing, etc.) so long as these were clearly communicated in advance and delivered in practice

Concert venues and timing


- Overall satisfaction as measured by "good" or "excellent" responses with our current venues (Q9, p.7) is at a high level: Bedford Girls' School (81%), Bedford School (88%) and Bunyan Meeting (100%).
- The comments show a nuanced understanding of the inevitable cons as well as pros of each venue, as well as offering some new suggestions: St Pauls' Church, the Quarry Theatre, and the Panacea Society (Q10, p.8)
- The survey findings (Qs11-13, p.9) suggest that formats other than "Music on Thursdays at 7:45" might be worth exploring: with 68% of respondents either choosing Friday, Saturday or "don't mind" with respect to the day of the week, and nearly a quarter (23%) opting for a matinee rather than an evening experience, or in many other cases (35%) being agnostic as regards the time of day.

Repertoire

- The free text comments (Qs16-17, pp12-14) are really very encouraging with regard to the balance of different periods and genres. The Club seems to be hitting exactly the right note, and the comments point to quality of experience as well as variety.
- For the reasons above, it seems pointless to dig too deeply into the answers to Qs14-15 (pp10-11) other than to say there may be a case for widening the offer further to include the occasional jazz concert as well as the inclusion of more twentieth century and contemporary repertoire.

Part 1: Life under extreme uncertainty

Normal concert life is impossible right now and it is a worrying time for artists, venues and audiences alike. We hope to resume as soon as it is safe, but that may not be for a while. The Committee is keen to explore what we can do over the coming season to keep you engaged. We have no fixed ideas except that any services would need to be provided over the internet, given the situation.





6 In the longer term, we are considering the possibility of live streaming Bedford Music Club concerts or offering you exclusive access (for a fee) to online concerts. There is a lot to think about and we make no promises. We are interested in any thoughts you might have about movement in this direction in the box below.

Good idea. It would perhaps enable more people to watch and at a time convenient for them.

This would be a positive step. As well as being in line with inevitable developments it would give members the option to appreciate a performance if they cannot attend in person and would enable those who do attend personally to revisit those events or parts of events they particularly enjoyed.

It would also help to promote the activities of the club generally.

I can wait until the concerts are back on again.

Definitely well worth considering until full capacity audiences are reinstated, but not as an alternative to a live concert once we are back to normal.

I should be interested in this idea.

The quality of the sound is so significant in whether it is worth watching online. It is also hard to achieve the intimacy that you get in a live concert. I wonder if extra attention should be put on introducing the pieces being played, with the context of the piece and for the performer.

Would support it for the Club, but can only watch on laptop

Seems like a good idea. I enjoy the live streams from the Royal Opera House - but will you have the same technical capability?

I prefer the live experience.

I would be very interested in this idea if it is the concerts you have run at Bunyan

We have to explore options, for our own enjoyment in listening to music as well as for supporting the livelihoods of musicians and other staff involved. Nothing beats the experience of a live concert, but streamed concerts/Zoom concerts are potentially the way forward in the short- to medium-term. I would be happy to support them and would appreciate the opportunity they can offer.

Yes I would definitely consider watching such a concert, with plenty of notice and information.

It might interest me but less for the events themselves than to support the series

I miss the Bedford Music Club concerts a lot and watching concerts online is a poor substitute. There is nothing like live concerts - live music must not be ended because of coronavirus! Outdoor concerts are being held in various places at present, although these are not suitable for the winter period. Indoor concerts are starting up again e.g. at the Stables from later next month. The Bedford Music Club concerts are not usually sold out in my experience - would it be financially on for the Club to hold them with a limited number of people using social distancing?

It would very much depend on the performer(s) and programme.

Would be interested.

I'm getting-on in years and I may be glad of using the radio/on-line rather more than at present. Your remarks about online concerts makes me wonder whether this would include local events like school recitals by pupils i.e. more of a community service perhaps so that the Club has a more continuing contact with Beds residents. It is important to consider the gradually smaller attendances to recitals up to last January, so there is an obvious need to adjust the style of concert, or just accept that the public's interest has moved away for classical. Would changes to smaller venue help the finance adequately?

We would be happy to have a live streaming in lieu of a live event in these difficult times

I think the problem is that I can't think of anything that the BMC can do which isn't already available. If I want to watch a performance there are thousands already available, so I don't need a search mechanism or anything like that. I understand your problem, but if I want online performance why wouldn'y just go to the Wigmore Hall site?

It is actually being physically present at a live performance that is the draw for me.

I think it would be worthwhile to look at the feasibility of live streaming future concerts as part of the subscription. This is sadly in anticipation of not being able to resume in the short term.

Part 2: Getting back to normal

At some point, concert life will begin to get back to normal - but things may be a little different in the short term. We may have to practise social distancing, go without intervals and refreshments, and have very limited opportunity for social interaction before or after concerts.

it is clear that you are aware of the steps necessary to keep people safe - and their impact! That is most reassuring, even though none of us can see clearly into the future. I think safety is a responsibility shared by audience members as well as concert organisers. Please carry on with your current approach, which we can support and adapt as time goes on.

Plenty of pictures on your website of what you've done

Social distancing measures with seats more spread out and a limit to the numbers attending. Track and trace lists for each concert. Hand sanitisers at entry and exit points and in toilets.

I said Unlikely above because I live a fair distance away from Bedford, so it would not be worth travelling for a less than satisfactory experience. So it's not really a question of confidence – I'm sure you will comply with current Covid-19 regulations – but one of how enjoyable the experience might be.

Unfortunately, I have reached the state when eyesight and other factors will prevent regular attendance.

Insist that each member should wear a face mask throughout the evening

We miss the concerts a lot, and would put up with a lot of regulations just to get us in front of live classical music again.


Obtain contact details of attendees. Check attendees temperature on entry and ensure attendees wear masks and social distance

Live concerts will survive the pandemic. We may not be able to offer you a programme this year, but at least we have a breathing space to think about the future and where, when and what you'd like to see.

Despite parking issues, the other two venues are excellent. The converted church in St Peter's Street might be worth looking at.

I've only attended a concert at Bunyan Meeting, so can't comment on the others.


All have some draw backs, Girls' school is rather big for present numbers and lacks any hint at cosiness.

More of the same, please.




Hand in there!
